



The Great Southern Wine Region showcases the best for international buyers

A trade delegation of nine international buyers from the premium wine import sector last week took a journey through Great Southern wine as they explored trade prospects in the Great Southern and Margaret River wine regions.

The visit coincided with media group from Singapore exploring captivating Great Southern experiences and premium regional food and wine ahead of the Discover Great Southern event series in Singapore in November, with the objective of lifting the brand and profile of Great Southern provenance and creating a compelling sense of place for an international audience.

Fine wines from over 20 Great Southern wineries were sampled by the buyers representing markets in Japan, Singapore, Malaysia, Vietnam, Thailand and the Philippines.

Great Southern Development Commission (GSDC) Chief Executive, Natasha Monks, said the wine buyers' mission was yet another successful exercise in the region coming together under an impactful Great Southern brand to demonstrate the unique advantages of the region in the premium wine sector.

"Export is all about relationships. By connecting international buyers directly with our winemakers on the land that the grapes are grown, harvested and the wine is produced means not only do they gain an appreciation for the quality of the wine, but they form

meaningful business relationships with the brands themselves," Ms Monks said.

"By bringing buyers into our beautiful region, they come to understand the distinct value of the Great Southern, and we take another step forward in the region's export growth, and international profile."

The international wine buyers' visit to the Great Southern included curated wine tastings and visits to wineries in the Great Southern wine sub-regions of Frankland River, Denmark, Mount Barker, Porongurup, and Albany.

The delegation was treated to a visit to the 2022 Wine Show of Western Australia in Mount Barker, and a Great Southern Wine Journey long table dinner hosted at Pepper & Salt Restaurant. Amongst the guests were the Hon. Alannah MacTiernan MLC Minister for Regional Development, Jane Kelsbie MLA member for Warren-Blackwood, Rebecca Stephens MLA Member for Albany, and stakeholders from across the region.

Another important step in strengthening international exports of Great Southern wines, the mission was the second of its kind via the Great Southern Tourism and Trade Partnership between the Australian Trade and Investment Commission (Austrade), GSDC and Australia's South West.

The mission was a collaborative initiative supported by the Great Southern Wine Producers Association, Australian Trade and Investment Commission, Great Southern Development Commission, South West Development Commission, Wines of Western Australia, with additional support from Australia's South West.







This last fortnight we had Peter Stewart from GreenSkills in Albany come out for two very informative and interactive workshops.

Peter has 30 years' experience and is the coordinator at the Albany Herbarium. He has also worked at the city of Albany as their Reserves supervisor and is also a part time TAFE lecturer specialising in Natural Resource Management, conservation, and horticulture.

The first workshop was one on vegetable growing with the kids. Peter brought with him a range of different soil/dirt types for the kids to have a feel and for them to guess which was the best type for growing vegetables in. They then covered a range of different things including how different vegetables and fruits grow and the conditions they need to thrive. They were able to dissect a broad bean pod to really get an up-close look at its seed.

Next, we looked at the weather for Frankland River, the average temperatures and rainfall and decided when the best time is to plant vegetable seeds. Peter took the kids out into the community garden to see what they are growing and to have a chat about the soil type we have here, the compost and worm farms. The kids all had a great time and I'm sure learnt a new thing or two from Peter.


The second workshop was for the adults and was specifically on saving seeds. Peter explained that to save seeds from plants you grow, you really need to start off with non-hybrid/old traditional/open pollinated seeds or plants, and to avoid hybrid F1 seeds. These are seeds that have been modified

and have part of both parent plants, and the characteristics of these seeds cannot be known. From one seed, if everything is done correctly you could have infinite supply of seeds/plants.

Peter explained the need to know the plant life cycle and the need for waiting until the plant matures. He recommended keeping a close eye on your plants for the perfect time to harvest/collect the seeds that you want to save, as wind, birds, other animals, and people brushing past can knock off all the seeds that you've waited so long to collect. He spoke about plant viability, labelling, winnowing and other harvesting methods as well as weather. All the things needed to save and re-grow seeds continually.

It was a great workshop, a lot was learned not just from Peter but from all who attended and gave their experiences and input as well.

Bloom Festival "Our Wetlands & Wildflowers Exhibition" Wrap

The Gillamii Centre partnered with local wildflower and orchid enthusiasts and also the Shire of Cranbrook to host an exhibition to display our local natural assets, in particular our unique wildflowers and various lakes to the local and broader community.

This event was part of the Great Southern Bloom festival and 162 people viewed the exhibition held at the Cranbrook Community Hub.

Camel Lake which is part of the Balicup Wetlands (the series of salt lakes to the north of the Cranbrook townsite and the Stirling Ranges) was a feature, with the camel skull loaned from the Cranbrook museum on display. Petrified wood from the Camel Lake and an interactive children's table looking for aquatic invertebrates all formed this particular exhibit.

The Council Corner

At the Council Meeting on 19 October 2022 Council had 12 reports to consider, amongst these were:

- Council have approved the allocation of \$28,000 in the 22/23 Budget for the purpose of demolition works on Lot 8 on Deposited Plan 205493 to assist The Frankland River District Country Club with the removal of existing buildings located on the Lot;
- Council have approved the submission of a grant application to the Department of Transport as a part of the Western Australian Bike Network (WABN) funding round. A provision of \$107,500 in the 2023/24 budget has been approved which is a 50% Shire contribution towards the construction of a shared pathway along Wingebellup Road in Frankland River if the application is successful:
- As a part of the Local Government Reforms, a voluntary reduction in Council size has been proposed moving from 9 to 7 councilors. Council has refused the Ministers request to undertake this process due to; improved representation of the demographic of the Shire, strong representation of the diversity of agri-business members, keen interest from individuals to stand for election and a change in legislation not yet approved by State Parliament:
- Mt Barker Speedway have been awarded the successful tender for the purchase and removal of the playground equipment located at the Frankland River Playground;
- Council have adopted Amendment 7 to the Shire of Cranbrook Town Planning Scheme No 4 which introduces provisions for a new Tourism zone into the scheme and rezones lots 182-191 Armstrong st, lots 192-199 Gilliam St and a portion of a right of way from residential to tourism;
- Council have approved amendments to three Council Policies: Policy 6.0 Emergency Services Bushfire Control, to approve the addition to the basic training benchmark. Policy 4.3 Capitalisation and Depreciation of Non-Current Assets and Policy 4.13 Corporate Credit Card;
- Council have authorised the CEO to advise Arc Infrastructure of the Shire of Cranbrook's intent to enter into a 3 year community lease for an area of land on the rail corridor in Cranbrook.



All grasses must be kept and maintained below 100mm throughout the dates mentioned in this notice

PURSUANT to the powers contained in Section 33 of the Act, you are hereby required on or before the 15th day of November 2022, to plough, burn, scarify, cultivate, chemically spray or otherwise clear firebreaks or fuel free areas and thereafter maintain them free of all flammable materials until the 15th day of April, 2023 in the positions and of such dimensions as detailed in the Shire of Cranbrook Annual Firebreak Notice.

Water-saving offers available to Great Southern towns

18th October 2022

Waterwise Towns Program open to 13 Great Southern communities until 31 May 2023 Offers include free showerhead swaps and a rainwater tank rebate Program saved 8.5 million litres of water in the Great Southern in 2021-22

Water Minister Dave Kelly has encouraged Great Southern residents to take advantage of free waterwise offers available as part of Water Corporation's 2022-23 Waterwise Towns Program.

The annual program was created to make it easier for regional Western Australians to use water more efficiently and save money on bills by making waterwise changes around the home.

Participating towns this year include Cranbrook, Gnowangerup, Hopetoun, Jerramungup, Kondinin, Kulin, Lake Grace, Newdegate, Nyabing, Pingrup, Ravensthorpe, Walpole and Wellstead, with residents eligible for a free showerhead swap and rainwater tank rebate.

The Showerhead Swap Program allows residents to replace up to two inefficient showerheads with waterwise alternatives, helping save up to 20,000 litres of water per household each year. In 2021-22, 108 Great Southern households made the switch, saving 2.1 million litres of water.

The rainwater tank rebate will support residents by providing up to \$1,000 to purchase a new rainwater tank, or up to \$500 to plumb in or replace an existing rainwater tank.

Since 2013-14, the State-wide Waterwise Towns Program has saved an estimated 1.7 billion litres of precious water - equivalent to 756 Olympic-sized swimming pools.

Offers are available to participating towns until 31 May 2023 or until stocks last.

"The Great Southern remains one of the areas most impacted by climate change anywhere in the world.

"While this year's winter rainfall has been very welcome, average rainfall throughout the region has been steadily declining since the 1970s as a result of climate change.

"In 2021-22, Great Southern residents saved 8.5 million litres of water through free waterwise offers like showerhead swap and rainwater tank rebates.

"As the State Government, through Water Corporation, continues to investigate new water source options to secure a water future for regional WA towns, small waterwise actions from the community are also important."

"Rainwater tanks plumbed into homes are an effective way to reduce scheme water use in the Great Southem", she said.

Fire danger ratings describe the potential level of danger should a bushfire start.

They are important because they provide people with information so that they can take action to protect themselves and others from the potentially dangerous impacts of bushfires.

From 1 September 2022, Australians will have a simplified, action-oriented Fire Danger Rating System.



- The AFDRS will also introduce 'no rating' for days where bushfires are unlikely to spread in a dangerous or lifethreatening way. On these days you still need to remain alert and abide by local seasonal laws and regulations.
- The AFDRS is informed by one of Australia's largest social research projects which found that most Australians do not understand the current system and would prefer a simpler, action-oriented set of fire danger ratings.
- The AFDRS is being implemented consistently across Australia and will mean that wherever you are across the country, you will be able to understand the threat posed on any given day and make appropriate decisions to keep you and your family safe.

Cardiovascular Awareness – How's Your Pump and Pipes?

It's no surprise that when we combine disease associated with the *heart* (pump) and *blood vessels* (pipes) it's our biggest killer, largest health problem, and places a great burden on our economy and health system. This of course is without even considering the issues around grief, loss of function and care requirements that can also impact individuals and families.

Cardiovascular Disease (CVD) is a major cause of death in our country. It kills one Aussie every 12 minutes and is responsible for causing one in four (26%) of all deaths. Someone is hospitalised for CVD every minute and those living in regional and remote areas, generally have higher rates of death from CVD than other Australians (Heart Foundation Aust).

Why Pump and Pipes? If we think about a pump moving water through a series of pipes, over time sediment can slowly build up and slow the flow of water or even cause a blockage. Most blokes would understand this would result in the pump having to work harder which can cause it to eventually fail or blow a hose.

This is no different to coronary heart disease which occurs through the build-up of fatty deposits (plaque) in the arteries that feed the heart. Narrowing reduces the supply of blood and oxygen to our heart and if this becomes too narrow it can cause angina (pain/discomfort in chest) or if a blood clot causes a complete block, then this can cause a heart attack. This is similar to when a clot occurs in blood vessels to the brain causing a stroke.

Warning signs for a heart attack may include a single or a combination of symptoms such as pain, heaviness or tightness in one or more areas of the upper body, shortness of breath, dizziness or a cold sweat.

If you think someone's having a stroke the Stroke Foundation has come up with an easy to remember checklist referred to as FAST:

• Face – Has their mouth dropped?

- Arm Can they lift both arms?
- Speech Is it slurred, can they understand you?
- Time Is critical, call 000 immediately.

Factors that contribute to CVD include family history (which we can't change) but some of the other risks we can manage by making healthy lifestyle choices are:

- don't smoke;
- maintain a healthy diet;
- do regular exercise;
- reduce our alcohol intake (take a couple of days off a week);
- · monitor our body weight;
- moderate our salt, sugar & fat intake; and
- look after our mental health & wellbeing.

It's important we acknowledge that a lot of CVD is preventable, however it's essential that we understand our individual risk factors that may impact on us developing diseases associated with our heart and blood vessels. The onset of other health issues such as diabetes, obesity, even erectile dysfunction can be an indicator that our pump and pipes could be under pressure.

So, just remember like any good piece of machinery, there are some basic *Operating Tips* to keep things running at optimal performance!


