Recipe's

SPANAKOPITA

Ingredients

300g English Spinach -Trim any thick stems, thoroughly wash, dry, then chopped into 2.5cm pieces

1/2 tsp salt 175g Greek feta, crumbled

1/2 cup Greek yoghurt 2 green onions/scallions, finely sliced

egg 2 tbsp mint, finely chopped

1 tbsp dill, finely chopped 1/2 tsp lemon zest

1/2 tbsp lemon juice 2 garlic cloves, finely chopped

1/2 tsp nutmeg, freshly grated1/4 tsp black pepper1/4 tsp salt1/4 tsp cayenne pepper16 sheets filo pastry120g butter, melted

60g Greek Kefalotyri cheese, finely grated (can substitute parmesan)

1/2 tsp white sesame seeds (or more black) 1/2 tsp black sesame seeds (or more white)

Instructions

Preheat oven to 220°C/430°F (200°C fan). Line a tray with baking paper/parchment paper. Place spinach in a large colander or bowl. Sprinkle with salt, toss through. Leave for 10 minutes to sweat. Place a handful of spinach in a tea towel, then wring out tightly to remove excess water.

Place spinach in a bowl with remaining Filling ingredients. Mix well to combine.

Cut 16 sheets of filo pastry into 32 x 25cm or 26cm square.

Layer 8 sheets of filo pastry on the tray, brushing each layer with melted butter.

Spread filling on filo pastry. Smooth surface and leave a 2.5cm border.

Cover spinach with a sheet of filo pastry. Brush with butter, sprinkle with Kefalotyri.

Repeat for Sheets #2 to #5. Then cover with filo sheets #6 to #8,brushing with butter in between, but do NOT sprinkle with cheese (neater finish).

Press edges down to seal. Crimp and trim if desired or just leave the edges flat on the tray.

Brush the top with butter, sprinkle with sesame seeds.

Bake 25 minutes, or until golden brown on the surface.

Serve immediately!

Connecting Kids to Country: Year 6 Barna Mia Camp

Gillamii has co-ordinated the Barna Mia camp since 2009, seeing multiple cohorts of year six students from Cranbrook, Frankland River, and Tambellup Primary School experience the Dryandra Woodlands and the biodiversity it has to offer. Students travel to the Dryandra Woodlands National Park, where more than 850 species of flora and fauna can be seen throughout the year.

This camp compliments the on-going Connecting Kids to Country environmental education program, which aims to support positive environmental attitudes and increase knowledge and awareness within our future stewards of the landscape. This camp was generously supported by South Coast NRM through the Federal Government's National Landcare Program, The Community Bank Tambellup/Cranbrook and the Mt Barker Co-Op.

On the 5th of April, twelve year six students from Cranbrook, Frankland River and Tambellup Primary School, teachers, Gillamii staff eagerly made the journey to the Dryandra Woodland for the overnight camp. The



group was introduced to Marty from DBCA who was a wealth of knowledge and took the students through native fauna trapping and monitoring activity.

Our first task was to bait and set the six cage traps and learn about fauna monitoring, as well as biodiversity and threats to our native fauna.


Following dinner, students headed to the Barna Mia Sanctuary for the nocturnal tour where students learned about the importance of the woodlands to our first nations people, and the threats facing wildlife before heading into the sanctuary to see the friendly natives up close. It is safe to say both the adults and students enjoyed the experience of seeing these often elusive natives, especially fauna that is extinct on the mainland.

An early wake up the next morning saw Marty and the group of students head back into the woodlands to see if their trapping was successful. Luckily we had a skilled bunch of conservationists, and we caught three Brushtail Possums and one Woylie.

Marty showed the students how wildlife biologists process fauna and capture important data, before learning how to safely release the animals into the wild.

It was a great trip, sweetened by coming back home for the Easter holiday.

Premier's Reading Challenge

How often does your child read to you? How often do you read to your child?

Be their reading legend! Reading just 10 minutes each day makes a difference.

By making time each day to either read with your child, or by encouraging them to read, you are making a huge difference to their literacy.

Reading helps children make sense of the world around them. It builds their curiosity, enhances their imagination and is a wonderful source of entertainment. Reading plays a part in all important literacy skills and can help to build independence and self-confidence.

We are encouraging all families to sign up and register for the PREMIER'S READING CHALLENGE to encourage more of our students to read regularly.

The Challenge:

Anyone from Kindergarten to Year 10 can register to take part in the challenge. You can access over 7,000 book titles, which can be logged onto your child's bookshelf. While the challenge is for your child to log a minimum of 12 books, feel free to log more!

You can log a book that is on the booklist or add a book.

By logging books, your child can be in the running to win fantastic weekly prizes. The prizes include experiences such as a zipline from Matagarup Bridge.

All students who log a minimum of 12 books over the challenge are also in the running for an end-of-year prize.

We want everyone to be able to access books in any format. The Premier's Reading Challenge has partnered with the State Library of Western Australia, who has a wide and growing range of electronic resources available for members and visitors. These include eBooks, online journals, audiobooks, eMagazines, current and historical newspapers and content services such as Ancestry and Kanopy. Over \$330,000 invested to boost technology in the regions

- Government grants program invests over \$330,000 to boost technology and innovation capabilities for Western Australian Community Resource Network
- \$334,034 awarded to 44 Community Resource Centre projects
- Katanning Hub, Tambellup, Pingrup and Frankland
 River Community Resource Centres all to receive funding

Rural and remote communities across Western Australia will benefit from the WA Labor State Government funding towards technology projects to improve community services.

More than \$330,000 has been awarded to support 44 Community Resource Centres (CRC) to implement technology and innovation projects across the regions.

Funding will allow the Frankland River CRC to create a Smart Home Hub demonstration centre, while the Katanning Hub CRC will purchase a portable video conferencing system. Tambellup CRC will upgrade their photo kiosk and Pingrup CRC will upgrade their public access computers.

The WA Community Resource Network has more than 100 CRCs across regional and remote areas of the State, with all CRCs eligible to apply under the grant program.

The program provides grants of up to \$10,000 per CRC and is administered by the Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development.

Member for the Agricultural Region Hon Shelley Payne MLC said

"Regional communities rely on CRCs as a source of information and as a hub to access services".

"Having appropriate technology at our CRCs is critical to support our regional community members".

"It is great to see funding for these technological upgrades to help keep our regional towns connected."

Regional Development Minister Don Punch commented: "CRCs are community-focused organisations which provide vital support to rural and remote residents and businesses throughout Western Australia.

"This initiative ensures that CRCs are well equipped with the technology to deliver modern services to people in their communities.



Shire of Cranbrook to save it for summer through Winter Sprinkler Switch-off

- Businesses and households in Shire of Cranbrook are required to switch off sprinklers from 1 June
- 60 billion litres of water saved across the State since 2010 enough to fill Optus Stadium 60 times
- 80 per cent of people do the right thing and switch off for winter

Households and businesses in the Shire of Cranbrook are being asked to save it for summer during the annual Winter Sprinkler Switch-off.

The switch-off is a permanent water efficiency initiative requiring scheme and bore users to turn off garden reticulation from 1 June to 31 August, helping save precious water for when it's needed most.

Each year, this simple yet effective measure helps save more than 5 billion litres of scheme water. Adopting water-saving practices inside and outside the home is vital as the State continues to adapt to the impacts of climate change on water supply.

A recent survey by Water Corporation found around 80 per cent of customers do the right thing and switch off their sprinklers in winter.

Using sprinklers during the switch-off can result in a \$100 fine if witnessed by a Water Corporation inspector, or a written warning if reported by a member of the public.

With nearly 70 per cent of non-compliance related to switching off late or switching on early, people are being encouraged to act now.

Since being introduced in 2010, the annual Winter Sprinkler Switch-Off has saved around 60 billion litres of water - enough to fill Optus Stadium 60 times.

Hand watering is permitted during the Switch-off and some exemptions may also apply. In areas of Western Australia not subject to the Switch-off, normal watering rosters and daytime sprinkler bans apply.

Comments attributed to Member for the Agricultural Region Hon Shelley Payne MLC

"It is great to see the Shire of Cranbrook and its community is being proactive to save water this winter", she said.

"This is important to ensure water sustainability now

and into the future."

"I encourage other Shires across the Agricultural Region to consider participating in this great initiative in the future".

Comments attributed to Water Minister Simone McGurk:

"The cooler months are a great time to switch off and let the winter rain take care of our gardens, saving water for the warmer months when there is a greater need for sprinklers.

"With over 40 per cent of home water use in the garden, average households can significantly reduce consumption during winter, lowering their bill and contributing to a total saving of some 5 billion litres of water.

"I'm urging everyone, including the one in five who may have forgotten to switch-off in the past, to do the right thing and ensure your irrigation is off from 1 June.

"Water Corporation is continually planning climate resilient water sources for WA, but it's important that we all work together to ensure future generations continue to enjoy a secure, sustainable water supply.








Updates from TTC




