2023 UPDATE

Dear Community Members,

We are thrilled to bring you an update on the progress of the Frankland River Community Cropping Group and extend our heartfelt gratitude to all those who have donated their time, products, and machinery to support our endeavours. It is through the collective effort and generosity of our community members that we have been able to achieve significant milestones this season.

The journey began on April 20th with the first spraying knockdown, skilfully carried out by Dave Brayshaw and Ben Beech. We are immensely grateful to the Beech and Hilder families for their donation of sprayers and operators, which enabled us to effectively kickstart our cropping activities. Their support has been invaluable to our success.

Following the knockdown, a pre-seeding lime application was completed by Nathan Waterman and Peter Ettridge. We would like to express our appreciation to Kevin Hawkes for generously lending his loader, which facilitated the quick and efficient loading of the spreaders. Their contributions played a crucial role in preparing the ground for seeding.

On April 28th, seeding commenced, and we were fortunate to have the assistance of Tom Bigwood, Dave Thomas, and Kim Lange, who generously donated their time and machines for a pre-emergent spray in front of the air seeder. Furthermore, we extend our sincere thanks to Jon and Grant Egerton-Warburton for donating the nurse truck that ensured the sprayers remained well supplied. The challenging seeding conditions, due to the late break of the season, were skilfully navigated by the Hilder family, with Adam Hilder behind the wheel and Simon overseeing the process on the Baxter block.

We were also thrilled to have the opportunity to try a new hybrid canola called PY520, a stacked triazine tolerant + clearfield variety. This seed was generously donated by Pioneer Australia, and we are truly grateful for their continued support. Additionally, we extend our heartfelt thanks to Gunwarrie for their generous donation of fertiliser for this seasons seeding, this was a very large donation that does not go unnoticed. Noel Keding's assistance in picking up and delivering the fertiliser with his truck is also greatly appreciated.

Post-seeding, Rhys Muir diligently kept the slugs and snails at bay with some baits, this was instrumental in protecting our crops and ensuring healthy plant growth.

As we progressed further, the time came for the first urea application and in-crop spray. We would like to extend our gratitude to Dan Challenor for his assistance in carting the urea, Richard Warburton for supplying his elevator and we sincerely thank Gunwarrie for their support with the spreading application.

Charlie Russell completed the first in-crop spray, utilising the sprayer generously donated by the Coole family. We also express our thanks to Joey Standish and Jon & Grant Egerton-Warburton for providing the necessary support to keep the sprayer topped up with their nurse truck.

In addition to our primary activities, the 10ha block on Poison Hill Road has again been generously donated and cropped by a local family. The proceeds generated from this block will be invested back into the community via the FRCCG. We extend our sincere appreciation for their support and commitment to our community.

The Frankland River Community Cropping Group would like to take this opportunity to express our deepest gratitude to each and every individual who has supported us thus far in the season. It is through your contributions that we can work towards bettering and developing our community. However, our journey is not yet complete, and we kindly request further support, either financial or physical, to continue our important work.

Our next task will be stick picking, and we warmly invite anyone who can lend a hand to contact Zali on 0418922178. Your assistance will be highly valued and greatly appreciated.



Recipe's

Lamb Shank Madras

Ingredients - 4 tbsp natural yogurt, 1 tbsp ground cumin, 1 tsp turmeric, 4 lamb shanks, 1 tsp sea salt, 2 tbsp sunflower oil, 4 onions sliced, 4 tbsp madras curry powder, 8 garlic cloves crushed, thumb-sized piece on ginger grated, 220g tin chopped tomatoes, 3 whole dried red chilies optional, 5 curry leaves, 4 cardamon pods split, 3 tbsp lime pickle, 300ml chicken stock. Method - Step 1-Tip the yogurt, cumin, turmeric, 1 tsp sea salt and the lamb shanks into a large mixing bowl and coat the lamb. cover and pop in the fridge for a couple of hrs. or overnight. Step 2-Heat the oven to 140C fan. Heat the oil in a large casserole dish over medium heat, add the shanks and brown all over for 10 mins until golden, remove from the dish. Scatter the onions into the dish and fry for 10 mins until golden brown. Stir in the curry powder, garlic and ginger, cook for 3 mins until aromatic. Add the lamb shanks back into the dish along with the tomatoes, chillies, curry leaves, cardamon pods and lime pickle. Give everything a good stir and pour over the stock. Bring to a simmer, cover, then transfer to the oven and cook for 3 hrs. Step 3 - remove the lid and cook for 1 hr more, this will help reduce some of the liquid and char any exposed meat. When the lamb is very tender, leave to rest for 30 mins or cool completely and serve the next day for optimum flavour. Can be made up to 2 days in advance. Scatter with chopped mint leaves and serve with naan bread and rice on the side.

The Story of the Purple Road


The Purple Road is a community project started by the Older People's Rights Service at Northern Suburbs Community Legal Centre to raise awareness of elder abuse.

Kaya! Hello in Noongar, ciao in Italian, hallo in Afrikaans and kamusta in Filipino!

The heavy rain we have recently experienced has brought the first signs of Makuru, the Noongar season of fertility. For Aboriginal families, fire would have been a useful resource for food preparation and production, tool and artefact production, hunting and during game, and for warmth and signalling. During Makuru, meat animals such as yonga (kangaroo) and weitj (emu) are hunted at this time of the year. Last week was National Reconciliation Week which marks the significant milestones in our reconciliation journey. As a school a priority has been on embedding the contributions of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples and Cultures in all the learning areas of the WA Curriculum. It has been great to see this learning across the school and we look forward to enhancing this in the future. Next semester we hope to be able to invite the school community to share in our learning in this area.

Our Faction Cross Country was held on Wednesday 14th June. Congratulations to all our students who did their best. It is a test of mental and physical endurance as students work hard to complete the course, both during training sessions and as part of the event. 












Entrance of a subterranean (underground) European wasp nest. The nest entrance is easily hidden amongst leaves.

The European wasp 2022-23 season has drawn to a close with 21 nests found and destroyed.

The optimum time to detect and locate European wasps (Vespula germanica) has passed. Traps have been cleaned and now is the time to reflect on another fruitful surveillance season. It is also time to say thank you to everyone across WA who adopted a surveillance trap, kept an eye out and reported anything unusual!

How did we go?

Nest numbers were much lower than last season; 21 compared to 53. Nest distribution indicates multiple areas of incursion across Perth, predominantly in and around industrial areas – which is typical of this hitchhiking pest. The nests detected did not show signs of 'overwintering', which means they were created this season. This is a promising indication that nests were not missed during last season's surveillance activities.

Public awareness and reporting remained strong. Residents, businesses, and local government all detected wasp activity in good time. This allows for nests to be found and trapping areas expanded where required. And finally, there have been no signs or reports of wasp activity since April!

Season highlights:

- 2,800 surveillance traps deployed across the Perth metropolitan region
- 75 regional traps deployed with 0 detections
- 171 new traps adopted by the community, bringing the total of 'Adopt a trap' subscribers to 1076
- 350 public enquiries, with 4 confirmed detections
- 21 nests found and destroyed across 6 Local Government Areas, all in the Perth metropolitan region
- the majority of nests were found in embankments of water sumps and drains
- a nest was located in a wood log at primary school playground – yikes!
- wasp flight paths were tracked to locate a nest on Perth Airport grounds
- no public injuries were reported from disturbing these cryptic and often hidden nests

Report your observations

What Do You Do When Someone Close to You Is Struggling But Won't Seek Help?

I was speaking with a bloke not long ago, Joe, who was feeling really frustrated when trying to help a mate who was avoiding Joe's attempts at support and refusing to seek help, even though he was obviously in some emotional distress. As is often the case Joe felt powerless in this situation and asked how he might better approach things.

So, what do we do when someone close to us, often a friend or family member, won't seek help? How do we manage the sense of obligation we may feel or the emotions that come with this?

First and foremost, we must remind ourselves that we do not carry the responsibility for other people's health and wellbeing, they do! However, in the above situation it is important to try and understand the reasons why some people are less likely to seek help when it is needed. We need to recognise that often when people are in the middle of a tough situation, simply making a decision to admit something is wrong can be a difficult and daunting thing. It can take time for some people to become comfortable enough with their situation to then contemplate the idea of accessing help. For others, negotiating feelings of embarrassment and shame can be quite overwhelming.

I take my hat off to Joe because, like him, we all need to recognise our role as primary carers, that is, everyday people in the community actively supporting and looking out for our mates.

Whilst our intentions can be coming from a good place, trying to get someone to change or seek help can put more of a strain on your friendship/relationship. Alternatively, simply avoiding the issue can foster stronger feelings of isolation and possibly result in the person becoming even more resistant. This can prove difficult when the time comes, and they are ready to reach out but may no longer feel comfortable with the idea of approaching you.

As difficult as these situations can seem, it is important to be there for people who are going

through a tough time. You can do this just by letting them know you are available to listen when they need it and help when they do decide to reach out. In the meantime, you could take the opportunity to do a bit of research into what specialised local support options might be available, if required, such as a counsellor, financial/legal support or the GP, so you can be prepared and direct them when they do reach out.

We also need to remind ourselves that the ability to listen effectively is one of the most important skills we can possess. Being a good listener can have a big impact on improving our relationships and helping others.

At the end of the day, it's also important to look after yourself. Setting clear boundaries is healthy and is all about understanding our limits. If you are starting to feel overwhelmed, talking to someone yourself can provide a good outlet and perhaps some insights into ways to manage the situation.

Most of the time, giving someone the space they need to arrive at seeking help is a good thing. However, if you do have concerns that someone is at imminent risk or danger to themselves or others, it is important that you act on this and seek professional help immediately. In these circumstances you may be worried about going against a person's wishes, but realistically most of us would rather deal with an angry response than a situation where the person we care about is seriously hurt or in trouble.


