PROGRESS UPDATE

Dear Community Members,

The Frankland River Community Cropping Group is thrilled to share the latest progress and happenings in our pursuit of supporting the development of our community and the local district club. Thanks to the tireless efforts of our committee members and dedicated volunteers, we have made significant strides this season, and we are excited.

Our Pioneer PY520 canola crop is flourishing, and we are pleased to report that it is looking good so far. The canola plants have entered the crucial stage of "peak cabbage," showcasing vibrant growth and promising potential. Additionally, we have observed encouraging signs of stem elongation, indicating a sea of yellow is only a few weeks away.

Over the past few months, Tim Trezise of Frankland Rural, our local agronomist, has been diligently monitoring our crop, providing invaluable advice, and extending continuous support to our group. His expertise and dedication have been pivotal in the success of our efforts and we extend our heartfelt gratitude to him for ensuring our canola crop receives the best care possible.

As supporters of sustainable agriculture, we are mindful of potential disease pressures that can affect crop growth. Our crop is currently facing a medium level of disease pressure. To safeguard the health and productivity of our crop, we plan to execute a flexi-n and fungicide spray, a strategy proven to support canola growth while reducing disease impact. To ensure we have the necessary resources for the flexi-n and fungicide spray, we are currently conducting a flexi-n drive. We seek to obtain liquid fertiliser (flexi-n) to bolster our crop's nutrient requirements. If you or anyone you know can contribute by donating flexi-n or would like to support us in purchasing it, we warmly encourage you to get in touch. Your contributions can make a significant difference in the success of our endeavors.

In our pursuit of fostering a thriving canola crop, we would like to express our deepest gratitude to everyone involved in the latest application of urea. Rhys Macleod of Shamrock Logistics played an integral role by picking up and transporting the urea, while Ben Beech diligently manned the truck, ensuring the spreaders were continuously filled. Special thanks to Richard Egerton-Warburton, who once again provided his conveyer auger, enabling quick and effective filling of the spreaders.

We also want to extend our thanks to Kieron Haynes, who generously provided his tractor and spreader, skilfully operated by Lee Baxter. Additionally, Nathan Waterman offered his tractor and spreader, which was expertly operated by Sarsha Kelly (after some initial troubleshooting!). Such a coordinated effort from our community exemplifies the spirit of cooperation and support that drives our community cropping group.

As we eagerly anticipate the next stages of our canola crop's development, we keep our eyes on the sky, hoping for ample sunshine and the ideal growing weather. With the support of our community, dedicated volunteers, and local suppliers, we are confident that this seasons canola crop will flourish and bring prosperity to our community.

Thank you once again to all of our volunteers for your unwavering support and dedication. Together, we are making a significant difference in the Frankland River community.





Recipe's

GOLDEN CHICKEN BRAISED GREENS & POTATO GRATIN

Ingredients

GRATIN - 800 g potatoes, 3 onions, olive oil, 1 organic chicken stock cube, $\frac{1}{2}$ a bunch of fresh sage, 100 ml single cream, 30 g Parmesan cheese

CHICKEN - 4 x 120 g skinless higher-welfare chicken breasts, a few sprigs of fresh rosemary,

2 rashers of smoked streaky bacon GREENS - 200 g baby leeks, 200 g baby spinach, 200 g frozen peas

Method - Scrub the potatoes clean, finely slice in the processor, then tip into the medium pan and cover with boiling water and the lid. Peel the onions, finely slice in the processor, then tip into the roasting tray with 2 tablespoons of oil, crumble in the stock cube and season with sea salt and black pepper. Tear in the sage leaves and stir regularly, adding a splash of water if they start to catch. On a large sheet of greaseproof paper, toss the chicken with salt, pepper and the rosemary leaves, then fold the paper over and bash and flatten the chicken to 1.5cm thick with a rolling pin. Put into the frying pan with 1 tablespoon of oil, turning after 3 or 4 minutes, until golden and cooked through. Drain the potatoes well in a colander, then tip into the onion pan, stir together and arrange in a flat layer. Pour over the cream, then finely grate over the Parmesan and pop under the grill on the top shelf. Halve the leeks lengthways, rinse under the tap, then finely slice. Put into the empty lidded pan on a high heat with 1 tablespoon of oil, stirring often. Finely slice the bacon and add to the chicken pan, tossing regularly. Stir the spinach and peas into the leeks and once the spinach has wilted and the peas are tender pile on a heard on platter with the chicken and become a tap. wilted and the peas are tender, pile on a board or platter with the chicken and bacon on top. Serve with the gratin.



Get a jump on spring by sprouting your own flowers and veggies indoors. There are several cost effective ideas that you can find laying around the house.

Not sure about you, but I always seem to have excess of egg cartons laying around. Why not use them to grow your seedlings indoors? Just place on a waterproof tray and fill them with potting mix. Plant your seeds and water often to prevent the medium from drying out, then plant the entire carton section straight into the garden.

Don't have space for a Greenhouse, convert a Storage Container into a Greenhouse, choose a container that is large enough to fit a seedling tray and drill a couple of 4-inch holes on each side for ventilation. Place the seedling tray on the lid and the storage bin on top. Remember to eave the container unlatched when the weather finally warms upl

At the Council Meeting held on 19 July 2023 Council had reports 8 to consider, amongst these were:

- Council noted the List of Payments from the month of June;
- Under Stage 4 of the LRCI program, Council have approved and prioritised a list of projects for construction to be completed under this program.
- Council have adopted the 2023-2024 Annual Budget, which includes the setting of Rates, adopting Fees and Charges and setting the Fees and Allowances of Elected Members;
- Two Road Safety Inspection Reports were presented to Council for the intersections of Wingebellup and Poison Hill Roads and Ballochmyle and Yeriminup Roads, Council authorised the impletion recommendations made within these reports to improve the safety of these intersections.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT REFORM PROCESS HOW IT HAS AFFECTED THE SHIRE OF CRANBROOK?

The Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries announced in November 2021, a package of major reforms to the Local Government Act 1995, that was based on six themes: earlier intervention and effective regulation and stronger penalties, reducing red tape, greater transparency, and improved financial management and reporting. They also included clear roles and responsibilities, and stronger local democracy and community engagement.

The Western Australian Local Government Association, which is the peak industry body and the united voice representing local governments in WA, presented its advocacy position and recommendations on these proposed local government reforms, and requested feedback from each local government as to whether they supported them or not.

The most important implementation to the Shire of Cranbrook was the proposal that a population of up to 5,000 would reduce to five Councillors including the President, and that the local government should follow a voluntary pathway towards reducing the number of its Councillors.

Whilst the Shire of Cranbrook's Council were supportive of reforms that provided improved efficiencies, they were strongly opposed to reducing the number of Councillors simply based on population. They felt that population did not reflect the varied communities of interest and the diversification of industries within the Shire of Cranbrook. They advised the Minister for Local Government at that time that, unlike other small regional local governments, there was not a lack of enthusiasm to stand for Council, and that reducing the number of Councillors would not provide true representation of the Shire. The Council wished to remain with nine elected officers. This would, in its opinion, provide "stronger local democracy and community engagement" as stated as the fourth theme out of the six themes proposed by the reforms.

The Minister's response was not provided as the legislation for any changes to the Local Government Act 1995 was not yet in place. By the time the legislation was passed and gazetted on 30th June 2023, Council was advised that they would have to reduce to seven Councillors and because they had not gone down the voluntary pathway, it was necessary under the legislation to step down the nine Councillors to elect seven as per number set by the Minister. So our nine hardworking Councillors will step down at the election day, and either (dependent upon choice) stand for re-election or if they have not nominated themselves, will conclude their term as a Councillor. In addition to the above changes, the Minister has also introduced optional preferential voting (a choice for the voters) and a very complicated way of calculating the results of the election. The Western Australian Electoral Commission is more involved this year with the process because of the changes, and whilst Council have elected to continue with in person voting at Cranbrook and Frankland River, many other local governments are voting by postal vote only.

Nominations for council will open on Thursday 31st August 2023.

Backyard Buddies

Your monthly guide to pests, weeds and diseases

Are those prawns in my garden?





Lawn "shrimp", Arcitalitrus sylvaticus,

Forget shrimp on a barbie, what are they doing in my garden?

The recent wet weather has contributed to an interesting report of some "tiny flea looking... prawn things" in a Perth resident's garden. This prompted us to re-visit a previous article on these curious crustaceans.

Lawn shrimp, Arcitalitrus sylvaticus, also referred to as lawn prawns or landhoppers, are terrestrial crustaceans from the family Talitridae. These tiny 5-20 mm nocturnal soil dwellers are normally found within the top few centimetres of soil/mulch, where they feed on dead organic material (particularly eucalyptus debris), turning it into fertiliser for the garden.

Heavy rain in winter can prompt a sudden emergence of lawn shrimp, sometimes in their hundreds, giving people a shock when they appear across lawns, garden beds and paving. Don't worry, they don't pose a threat to people, pets, or the environment.

Lawn shrimp are related to marine and freshwater crustaceans but lack the waxy coating on their exoskeleton which aids the retention of moisture.

retention of moisture. They need moist soil to live and feed in, but if the soil is too wet or too dry the shrimp emerge from the soil looking for more suitable habitat. Sadly, they often find themselves on paving or driveways dying of dehydration and starvation. Poor things.

Equipped with seven pairs of leg-like appendages, they move with a springing action using their three pairs of "hind" legs. It's likely this movement, and their tiny size, that leads people to suspect they're fleas.

Lawn shrimp breed year-round and the mated female lays eggs in a pouch on the underside of their body. The babies are a smaller version of the adults and leave the pouch soon after hatching. How cute!

Do I control these?

There's no need for control. Just sweep them up and return them to the garden to add to the organic content in the soil.

If present in your garden, these cute little crustaceans will disappear with the return of drier weather. If you haven't seen them, why not take a closer look for these little curiosities!

Self-Care - What Does it Look Like for Blokes?

A statement I often find myself saying to family members, friends, and individuals I interact with through the work we do at Regional Men's Health is look after yourself mate! This message does come from a genuine place of concern for these people and encompasses a key component of our vision statement which is to empower men and communities to take responsibility for their wellbeing and health. However, what does it really mean and look like for blokes living and working in regional, rural and remote WA?

Looking after oneself is best described as *self-care*. This involves a deliberate and self-initiated act to help maintain our physical, mental, or social/spiritual wellbeing. As humans, we all live different lives and the circumstances around our work, family commitments, individual capacity and environmental factors can change, so self-care will vary from person to person. However, for most of us we should endeavor for it to be:

- Regular & ongoing (it's not just a one-off thing we do and forget about for the rest of the year).
- More than just the time left over. Don't leave yourself the dregs, time for self-care must be a necessity not a luxury! Factor it into our daily, weekly, or monthly routine/planning.
- An important part of our work-life balance. It can help us cope with challenging times and makes us more effective managing the demands of daily life.

For a lot of men, the pursuit of business goals and success (warrior attitude - winning) often pushes personal wellbeing and health issues down our list of priorities. When we think about it, acts of self-care give us the opportunity to reset and gives a circuit breaker effect on the daily grind and rat race that life can often feel like. Especially in these times of fast-moving technological advances, bombardment of social media influences, information accessibility and blurring of work-life balance (i.e. working from home, 24/7 access through smart phones). Self-care makes us more effective and offers us a buffer from the bumps in the road of life and ignoring this fact can result in us not being up to par in any aspect of our lives. Relationships can become strained, we can suffer burn out, harbor resentment, and miss out on the things that we don't realise are important until they're gone.

There is a varying range of definitions for self-care, but they all point towards us as individuals making the time to do things on a regular basis to help us live well and supports good physical, mental and social/spiritual wellbeing, including but not limited to:

- Starting with small changes that we can manage.
 Ask yourself 'what's in my control, do I need to learn to say no to unhelpful habits, behaviors, or extra commitments?'.
- Changing our mindset and putting ourselves first.
 We shouldn't see this as selfish but a form of good self-management. We must actively plan and commit for self-care to happen.
- Being connected to our passions, interests and a sense of belonging (family/community).
- Eating well, regular exercise and a good sleep routine.
- Getting a checkup with our GP and other health care professionals.

Remember, self-care starts with you so try doing something that makes you feel good, gets you excited and puts a smile on your face. If you're finding it hard to do this don't forget ... before it all gets too much... Talk to a Mate®!!

Cranbrook Motocross Geared up to host South West Championships

Spectators and riders will not be disappointed with the Sukey Hill track when Cranbrook Districts Motorcycle Club host Round 4 of the South West Championship Series on Sunday 13th August.

Bulldozers, loaders, ploughs and bobcats have been busy preparing the 1.9km motocross track ahead of the event.

Sukey Hill is one of the few open and flowing motocross tracks in the WA circuit that capitalises on natural terrain. The track surface is a combination of deep sand at the start line to clay at the highest point Harvey Hill, which poses a challenge to its riders when selecting bike tyres.

Man-made jumps have been added to challenge the riders being; step-up, whoops, table tops, sweeping berms and rollers.

This event has become a calendar highlight for the

Cranbrook Motocross club, with over 100 riders expected to compete across 11 junior and senior classes.

It's a jam packed day with racing getting underway at 9am following a practice round.

The six competing clubs who make up the championship series are; Manjimup, Southern Capes, Collie, Bunbury, Narrogin and Cranbrook.

Throughout the season each club hosts one event with the season wrapping up late September.




