

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INFORMATION TO PROPERTIES AROUND THE SCHOOL SITE REGARDING OUR SCHEDULED BUILDING CONDITION ASSESSMENT

Building Condition Assessments (BCA) are carried out at all schools at regular intervals as part of the Department of Education's overall asset management strategy.

In addition to the inspection of buildings and internal areas, aerial surveys using drones will be used to capture footage of roof condition and coverings, including penetration points, box gutters and safety anchor points. In the previous 2018 BCA program drone aerial imagery was successfully used across all schools to capture roof condition and maintenance information.

The drone will operate within the school area to capture buildings, ovals, carparks, and surrounding street parking bays. The drone will ensure the privacy of neighbouring properties (i.e., not show private spaces in photos or videos, such as backyards).

The Department of Finance have engaged licensed drone operators from Duratec Australia who will conduct these surveys at our school site. Drone operators will be wearing uniform and carry appropriate identification.

Drones will typically operate during daylight hours, typically between 6.00 am and 6.00 pm weekdays, on weekends or during school holidays. Drone operators are required to comply with the necessary insurances and certifications including:

- current Civil Aviation Safety Authority (CASA) safety rules and requirements; and
- the relevant Remote Pilot License (RePL) and a Remotely piloted aircraft Operator's Certificate (ReOC) certification.

All drone footage will be stored and maintained for internal use only.

Please therefore do not be concerned if you see drones flying over the school.



Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development **Backyard Buddies**

Your monthly guide to pests, weeds and diseases

Don't tip toe through these tulips!

You might have recently noticed these pretty looking flowers when walking through the bush, spotted them growing along roadsides or seen them in paddocks, particularly in the Southwest of the state. Members of the Iridaceae (Iris) family, these lovely looking flowers are actually a serious and widespread weed in Western Australia. They are commonly called the One-leaf and Two-leaf Cape Tulip.

As the name suggests, One-leaf Cape Tulip typically has only one leaf per plant. The flower colour ranges between orange and salmon pink with a yellow centre. It reproduces via both seed and annually renewed corms. The seeds and corms sprout in autumn after rain, with up to 60% of corms potentially staying dormant each year.

Two-leaf Cape Tulip has a similar looking flower but can be distinguished by having two to three leaves per plant. It sprouts in autumn and flowers in spring. However, unlike the one-leaf variety, it doesn't seed, but produces cormils on its stems. Why control: Both varieties of cape tulip are a serious weed of pastures, roadsides, wastelands, and bushland. In pasture, livestock often selectively graze clovers and other more palatable species, which allows cape tulip to flourish. However, if eaten, all parts of cape tulip are toxic to livestock while the plant material exists - whether it is alive, dying, or dead. Spraying with herbicides does not remove its toxicity.

When to control: The optimal time for chemical control of both plants is July to September, when they flower, and the corm is exhausted. After this time the plant material will start to dry out, making any kind of chemical difficult for the plant to absorb.

If you have missed the opportunity to control this year, all is not lost. Take note of where you have seen Cape Tulip so you can be prepared and ready to control it for the next season.



Block your driver's licence to lock-out identity thieves

Money is not the only thing scammers are looking to steal these days – your

personal identification can be just as valuable to them.

As part of their ruse, scammers posing as legitimate organisations or government service providers often pretend to need copies of your driver's licence and passport to verify your identity, when their actual aim is to steal it.

Having your identity stolen can cause devastating and long-lasting impacts, from finding unauthorised purchases on your credit card, through to having your name used to open bank accounts, take out loans and even to scam other people.

Just recently, Consumer Protection issued a <u>warning</u> about a fake WA Seniors Card website that was targeting seniors for both their money and multiple forms of identification. In reality, the WA Seniors Card is free of charge and applicants are never requested to pay a fee, or disclose personal identification in exchange for membership.

Aside from sending scammers your personal information, the other way they can get their hands on it is through data breaches that occur when cybercriminals hack into an organisation's system and leak their customers' details onto the dark web.

To help protect all WA consumers from identity theft, the Department of Transport has made it possible to put a <u>block on your driver's licence</u> to stop it being used to verify your identity online.

Putting a block on your driver's licence or learner's permit means if a scammer tries to use these documents for identity verification through the Australian Government's <u>Document Verification Service</u> (DVS), it will be declined.

You can add and remove a driver's licence block anytime using <u>DoTDirect</u> by navigating to the 'Protect your identity' section on the 'Driver's licence' page. Your authority to drive is not affected by having a block on your driver's licence.

Don't get caught in a subscription trap

Whether it's a gym, streaming service, or dating site you're signed up to, it can be tricky keeping track of how much money is leaving your bank account each month to pay for subscriptions and memberships.

These small, but regular, costs can soon add up and contribute to cost of living pressures, so it can be worthwhile taking the time to see which services are worth keeping and which ones aren't.

In the past 12 months, almost 300 consumers have come to Consumer Protection with complaints about subscriptions and memberships – nearly a third of which involved issues cancelling fitness services.

Under <u>WA's Fitness Code</u>, consumers are allowed to cancel their fitness service electronically, with direct debits to stop once the last payment due under the contract has been paid. Prior to the end of the initial term of an agreement, fitness providers must also notify consumers before automatically renewing their memberships, thus giving them the opportunity to cancel without penalty.

Subscriptions traps are one of the many so-called 'dark patterns' that may be deceiving consumers online by tricking them into parting with more money than they intended to.

A subscription trap may occur when an online retailer or service provider treats a single purchase or free trial as consent to sign consumers up to a paid subscription without adequately disclosing that ongoing fees are involved. Deceptive design patterns are often built into the interface, such as pre-ticked checkboxes, trick questions and redirection.

To avoid getting caught in a subscription trap, make sure you've read and understand the terms and conditions before signing up to see whether any ongoing fees are involved. If you sign up for a free trial with the intention of cancelling the subscription before the billing date, it can be helpful to set yourself a calendar reminder.

When reviewing existing memberships and subscription services, look through your bank statements to see what you're paying for, then think about which services you use and check whether there's a better deal, cheaper plan or low-cost alternative. Cancel any subscriptions or memberships you're not using or getting value from.
