

## Recipe's

#### Crispy chicken with honey miso chilli dressing and messy noodle salad

Ingredients 500g skinless, boneless chicken thighs 1/2 cup plain flour for dusting 2 eggs lightly whisked with 1 tbsp oyster sauce Crumb 4 cups cornflakes 3/4 cup freshly grated parn 1/4 cup onion flakes 1 heaped tsp sweet smoked paprika Salad

270g soba or udon noodles cooked according to packet instructions, rinsed under cold water to halt cooking.

4 cups sliced red cabbage. generous 1/2 cup diced mint generous 1/2 cup of coriander leaves. Dressing 1/2 cup honey 4 tbsp sriracha 2 tbsp white miso paste

Preheat the oven to 180C. Line a large baking tray with baking paper.

Set 3 bowls along your kitchen bench and add, from left to right, the flour, the crumb mixture ingredients (give these a quick stir to combine) Roll the thighs out so that they are flat, then coat each chicken fillet in the flour before dredging in the whisked egg mixture and finally coating in the cornflake crumbs. Season with salt and black pepper.

Place the chicken on the roasting tray and bake for 15-18 minutes, or until the chicken appears crisp and golden and is completely cooked through.

While the chicken is cooking, prepare the dressing by adding the ingredients to a small saucepan and placing over low-medium heat. Cook until incorporated and warmed through

Set aside.

Combine salad ingredients in a bowl and add 3/4 of the dressing mixture. Toss gently to coat then divide among serving bowls.

Slice the chicken into bite sized pieces and place on top of the cooked noodles. Drizzle the remaining dressing directly over the chicken. Serve immediately.

Autumn is once again here; in your garden you will find certain crops dying back and stop producing as the days get shorter and cooler. As these crops finish, we need to be prepared for the next lot of planting which is cool-season plants. Do not forget when replanting to add some fresh compost, manure, and some organic fertiliser to give the plants the extra nutrition they need. You also may need to have some temporary shade set up for the new seedlings as we can still get some very hot weather in autumn.

Have you been watching rabbit numbers increase and need management information? We've collated some of the most useful resources to assist you.

#### Other key websites & resources

• **Pestsmart.org.au** is a hub of best practice information, management guides and videos for the control of various animal pests in Australia, including rabbits.

- Feralscan.org.au press on the 'RabbitScan' icon to view rabbit sightings made across the country. You can also report rabbits you suspect have died from a virus and request a sampling kit for laboratory identification.
- Recognised Biosecurity Groups (RBGs), Landcare groups, Natural Resource Management (NRM) organisations etc – are local resource centres, see what's around you and what's on offer.
- Licensed Animal Pest Management Technicians – animal pest controllers are less common than insect pest controllers, but they advertise through the same channels (online, print, white pages etc.). They are fee-for-service providers.

#### The Council Corner

The Council held their Annual Electors Meeting on 6 February 2023 in Cranbrook to discuss the 2021/22 Annual Report. The purpose of this meeting was to present The Shires 2021/22 Annual Report and for attendees at the meeting to raise any questions regarding the content of the Annual Report.

At the meeting a member of the public (Mr Peter Denton) put forward a question in regards to the Shire's Planning for the Future—Strategic Community Plan. Mr Denton asked — "Can the Shire advise on what they are doing to promote Cranbrook as 'The Gateway to the Stirlings' " in which the Deputy President invited Community Development Manager, Jenny Cristinelli to respond;

The Shire is currently in the process of implementing Phase 2 of the Information Bay Project, located on Dunn Street/Climie Street. Part of Phase 2 is the install of Signage. The Shire has engaged with the consultants (Outdoors Great Southern) who are collaborating the contents of the signage, we propose to incorporate "Gateway to the Stirlings". In relation to promotional items, Shire staff will investigate options and costings which will be consider for the 2023/2024 budget. "Gateway to the Stirlings" being one of the brandings. Also, to be considered for the 23/24 Budget is minor renovations to the Gateway Arch located on Salt River Road near the railway crossing, (e.g. painting) along with the potential inclusion of Darwinia Bell, this being a suggestion only. Of recent, minor gardening works has been undertaken on the four entry statements into Cranbrook, including mulching. Plantings around the base of the statements will occur when weather permits.

Lastly, 'Gateway to the Stirlings' status is registered with the Australian Government, IP (Intellectual Property) Australia under the Shire of Cranbrook. Trademark No. 2018817. This status is due for renewal on the 10 July 2029. This ensures the safety of the wording being for the use of the Shire of Cranbrook only.

The Ordinary Council Meeting was held on the 15 February 2023 in Cranbrook, and this was a combination of both December 2022 and January 2023, as per the usual practice of not holding a Council meeting during the month of January.

At the Council Meeting on 15 February 2023 Council had reports to consider, amongst these were:

- The Council noted the List of Payments from December:
- A Planning Application for a proposed single house (new transportable) and carport was presented and approved by The Council;
- General business was carried out in the duration of this meeting;

The Shire of Cranbrook Administration Office will be closed for the Labour Day Public Holiday on Monday 6 March 2023, re-opening Tuesday, 7 March 2023 at 8:30am.

#### **CAMPING AND COOKING FIRES**

No camping or cooking fires are permitted within the Shire of Cranbrook during the Prohibited Burning Period 1 November to 14 February (Dates inclusive); During the Restricted Burning Period 1 October to 30 October and 15 February to 30 April (dates inclusive);

- A) a permit must be obtained from the local Fire Control Officer for all camping and cooking fires on private property; and
- B) Additional written permission must be obtained from the Local Government CEO for all camping and cooking fires located on Shire property and Council Reserves; and
- A camping and cooking fire is described as;
- A solid fire which is contained in a designated fire pit, or
- A solid fuel barbeque contained in a fire safe receptacle, or;
- A wood fired pizza oven

That must meet safety requirements detailed in Section 25 of the Bushfires Act 1954. A camping and cooking fire not contained by one of the above mentioned practices, are not permitted.

# Walking up to 20 kms a Day Our Ancestors and Exercise

Our ancestors were used to walking up to 20 kilometres per day, they had to, to survive on the Savannah Plains and the Serengeti or they would end up as someone's lunch. We are not designed for sitting around and not exercising. The human body has not had millions of years to adapt to our sedentary lifestyle and we need to change our habits before it is too late.

Blokes have had a significant change because many of the work tasks that have always been manually done are now obsolete or automated.

Exercise is essential for our brain, mind, body and our cardiovascular health. I read a book titled *Brain Rules* by John Medina and rule 1 (out of 12 brain rules) is *exercise boosts brain power*. An enlightening read.

There are a lot of variables, from nurture to nature, that help how we age but one of the greatest predictors of successful ageing is the absence of a sedentary lifestyle. Industrialization has given us many benefits, but it has also meant, that for most of us, we have gradually quit moving. The result of this is more and more Australians are being classified as being overweight, with the fastest growing chronic condition in Australia in 2022 being Type 2 Diabetes.

There is a lot of current research that suggests exercise can:

- 1. help prevent Type 2 Diabetes (by up to 60%);
- improve our cardiovascular health thus decreasing the risk of strokes and heart attacks;
- 3. affect the outcome of both anxiety and depression. The fact that exercise helps regulate the release of chemicals (serotonin, dopamine, and norepinephrine) into our bodies makes it an important element in maintaining the right balance;
- 4. halve the risk of general dementia through aerobic exercise, just twice a week. It can also cut the risk of Alzheimer's by 60%.

So, what does this all mean for our exercise regime?

There is a lot of advice around with different suggestions on exercise requirements. This varies from 5 minutes high intensity, to 30 minutes per day, to 1 hour a day every second day. We are the only one that knows our body's physiology and what will

ultimately work for us. A guide is a minimum of 150 minutes per week of moderate exercise.

If you are limited in how you can exercise you can still make a difference. If you can physically walk only 50 metres a day, double it! Walking 100 metres per day compared to 50 metres can make a difference. The improvement in your body's physiology will be profound and the positive effect is that starting with a little bit of exercise will make you want to move more.

Exercise options are endless, swimming, hydrotherapy, light gym work, walking groups, belonging to sporting groups, volunteering. Although in regional WA sometimes these options can be limited for people to access.

Don't let it stop you exercising – get moving!
