Cranbrook Police News

This month I am addressing a couple of questions recently raised by the community.

Reacting to an emergency vehicle on the road

Legislation requires road users who are travelling in the same direction as an emergency vehicle with its emergency lights on, to slow down and move over (SLOMO). The requirement is for vehicles travelling in the same direction as the incident to slow to 40kmph. If you are travelling in the opposite direction you can maintain your speed and if the incident is in the middle of the road, then both directions are to slow to 40kmph. Failure to slow down and/or move over may see you issued with an infringement of \$300 and 3 demerit points.

Electric Rideable Devices

Electric Rideable Devices (ERD) are commonly E-Skateboards, E-Scooters and Hoverboards. They have at least one wheel, are designed to be used by a single person and have an electric motor. Segway's, electric bikes, motorised wheelchairs and motorised scooters are covered under different legislation and are not subject to the same rules that I am discussing in this article.

ERD's are not permitted on a carriageway (road) with a dividing line or median strip, on a one-way carriageway with more than 1 marked lane or on a carriageway with a speed limit exceeding 50km/h. It is not an offence if the rider crosses the carriageway by the shortest safe route and does not stay on the carriageway longer than necessary to cross safely.

Common offences include:

- A person must not ride an ERD on a road or path unless the person is wearing a protective helmet securely fastened on the persons head.
- The rider of an ERD must not carry a passenger or animal on the ERD.
- A person who is under 16 years of age must not ride an ERD with its motor engaged.
- A person must not ride an ERD on a carriageway, bicycle path or shared path at a speed exceeding 25km/h.
- A person must not ride an ERD on a footpath (other than a bicycle path or shared path) at a speed exceeding 10km/h.

It's been a minute since I have written an article, so before I update you on some of the other things that have been keeping Cat and I busy, I just wanted to acknowledge what a successful harvest season we had in relation to road safety. In the lead up to harvest we were out there conducting random drug tests on all road users, with my usual focus on truck drivers. Such a

great result that not one truck driver provided a positive result to our testing processes.

Over the past couple of months our little lockup has earnt its keep with the following investigations and outcomes:

- As a result of a search warrant executed at an address in Frankland River a 51 year old female was charged with two drug related offences
- A 27 year old male was charged with no authority to drive – cancelled
- A 54 year old male was charged with Failure to Comply with Reporting Obligations (x 2) and breaching his bail undertaking
- A 56 year old male was charged with Defilement of girls under 13 years (x 4). This is the wording of some old legislation and the equivalent charge currently, would be sexual penetration of a child under 13 years.
- A 45 year old male was charged with breaching a Police Order and disorderly behaviour in public
- A 49 year old female was charged with drug driving
- A 34 year old male was charged with breaching a family violence restraining order
- A 22 year old female was charged with assaulting a public officer (hospital staff)
- A 17 year old female was charged with no authority to drive - never held

Looking forward, we have some great events to attend including the Frankland River Family Fun Day and the Cranbrook Show. There is a rumour that Constable Care will be heading down for the Cranbrook Show and might have been challenged to a running race by some other agency mascots so hopefully everyone is putting in a bit of training and remembers to stretch .

There has been a bit of movement in our neighbouring stations lately. Sergeant Dave SWAIN who was the Officer in Charge of Tambellup has now transferred to Mount Barker Police Station which is great for us to keep him as a neighbouring support. Senior Constable Darren GILLIS (who many of you know from his country music singing) is currently acting in the OIC role at Tambellup until that vacancy is filled. Todd D'SOUZA was recently appointed as the new OIC of Gnowangerup Police Station, replacing Tom GRIEVE who transferred to a role as a Detective Sergeant at Major Crash.

Towards the end of March, Cat will be heading up to Perth for a forensics training course before taking a few weeks off with her family. Her position will be filled by Constable Trent D'ERCOLE from Gnowangerup for the month.



Recipe

Pumpkin, spinach and bacon muffins

Ingredients

3 bacon rashers, finely chopped, 1 1/2 cups (225g) self-raising flour, 1/4 cup (40g) cornmeal (polenta), 80g butter, chopped, 1 1/2 cups (360g) pumpkin. coarsely grated, 1 cup spinach, finely shredded, 100g fetta, crumbled, 2 Eggs, 3/4 cup (185ml) buttermilk, 2 tbsp pepitas (pumpkin seeds)

Method

Step 1. Preheat oven to 180C. Line a 12-hole, 1/3-cup (80ml) muffin pan with squares of baking paper. Step 2. Cook the bacon in a small frying pan over medium heat for 5 mins or until lightly golden. Transfer to a plate lined with paper towel to drain

Step 3. Combine the flour and cornmeal in a large bowl. Use your fingertips to rub the butter into the flour mixture until it resembles breadcrumbs. Add the pumpkin, spinach, bacon and fetta. Gently toss to combine.

Step 4. Whisk the **eggs** and **buttermilk** in a jug. Pour into the flour mixture and stir until just combined (don't overmix or the muffins will be tough).

Step 5. Spoon evenly among the lined pans. Sprinkle with **pumpkin seeds**. Bake for 25-30 mins or until lightly golden and cooked through. Serve muffins warm or at room temperature.

Living by the law: what you need to know before share housing

Splitting a rental with mates or even people you find through an advert can be a smart way to tackle soaring rent prices and low vacancy rates. But before you start dividing up chores and discussing furniture options, it's important to understand your legal rights and responsibilities when it comes to share house arrangements.

In co-tenancies, there is a shared tenancy agreement, but all tenants are jointly responsible for the full rent amount, bond and condition of the entire property. This means if your house mate misses a rent payment, for example, the whole household could be at risk of breaching the tenancy agreement unless they can cover the outstanding amount.

When it comes to paying the bond, each contributor must be listed against the bond as a tenant. The private landlord or agent then has 14 days to lodge the bond with the Bond Administrator.

Consumer Protection has recently had two real estate agencies and directors fined and reprimanded for failing to lodge tenancy bonds within the required timeframe. Renters deserve peace of mind knowing their bonds are being handle by landlords and agents in accordance with the law.

It is important tenants receive an immediate receipt of their payment. The Bond Administrator will also send the tenants and the private landlord/agent a record of the payment directly from the department. This also ensures each tenant is returned their correct share of the bond when the tenancy ends.

If you move out of a share house, negotiate to have your name removed from the tenancy agreement. If you fail to do this, you can still be held responsible for the rent and other obligations. Also ensure you are provided with an outgoing property condition report. If anything needs to be addressed the cost will be recovered from your share of the bond.

Similarly, if you move into a share house ask for the tenancy agreement to be varied to list you as a co-tenant and add your name to the bond. The landlord/agent should provide an up-to-date property condition report. As the new co-tenant, you cannot be held responsible for the condition of the property before you moved in.

We advise only entering into shared tenancy agreements with people you trust and communicate well with. We know this can be difficult to gauge when replying to an ad looking for a house mate, so we recommend putting everything of importance in writing to protect yourself. This may include agreements about how and when rent and bills are paid, responsibility for everyday cleaning and maintenance of the property, ownership of any shared belongings and use of common areas.

If one tenant has paid another tenant's share of rent or other money owed to the landlord, the tenant can apply to the court for an order they be repaid by the other tenant. If you need assistance with money owed by a co-tenant or other similar dispute, reach out to your local community legal centre for more advice.

When everyone decides to move out of a share house the tenancy ends in the typical way.
