Recipe

Middle Eastern lamb

Ingredients

1/4 cup extra virgin olive oil, plus 2 Tbsp extra, 1/4 cup ground cumin, 1/4 cup ground coriander, Sea-salt flakes and freshly ground black pepper, to season, 1.5kg boneless lamb neck or shoulder, diced, 1 brown onion, roughly chopped, 1 clove garlic, smashed, 400g can diced tomatoes, 500ml chicken stock, 400g can chickpeas, drained, rinsed, 100g baby spinach leaves, 1/2 cup dried apricots, halved, Parsley and mint leaves, to garnish, Couscous, to serve

Method

Step1. Put oil, cumin and coriander in a large bowl and season. Add lamb and toss to coat. Heat extra oil in a large heavy-based saucepan over a medium heat and add 1/2 of the lamb. Cook, stirring occasionally, for 5 minute or until well browned. Transfer to a plate and repeat with remaining lamb.

Step 2. To the same pan, add onion and garlic, stirring for 5 minutes or until onions are golden. Return lamb to pan. Add tomatoes and stock to pan. Bring to the boil then reduce heat to medium, simmering for 1 hour 30 minutes. Stir in chickpeas, spinach and apricots, cooking for a further 5 minutes. Garnish with parsley and mint. Serve with couscous on the side.

E-Waste Collection

Did you know you can now take your broken computers, TVs and other electronic devices to the Cranbrook Waste Facility and the Frankland River Waste Facility for recycling free of charge?

The State Government announced there was a statewide ban on e-waste disposal to landfill on 30 June 2024 as part of ensuring all Western Australians take responsibility for managing waste better.

E-waste can contain precious metals such as gold, copper and nickel, and rare materials of strategic value, such as indium and palladium. These precious metals can be recovered, recycled and used as valuable source of secondary raw materials.

E-waste can contain hazardous materials and should be collected and recycled correctly to prevent harm to the environment and human health.

The Shire of Cranbrook would like to acknowledge the Department of Water and Environmental Regulation who provided a grant to build sheds for e-waste collection and storage at each location, enabling the Shire to move toward a more environmentally responsible future.



Ride a quad bike, not an ambulance

Quad bikes are the leading cause of death and serious injury on Australian farms. School holidays and good weather often mean farm visits and

quad bike adventures. Consumer Protection urges families to prioritise safety when it comes to quad biking.

Sixty per cent of quad bike fatalities occur during a roll over. Even at slower speeds, these bikes can topple over and crush the rider with hundreds of kilos of machine.

Despite being marketed as "all-terrain vehicles", quad bikes cannot safely go anywhere and everywhere. Steep slopes or rough terrain increases the risk of a roll over.

Since October 2021, general-use quad bikes must have an Operator Protection Device (OPD) fitted or integrated into its design so if the bike rolls over, it's held off the ground, and the rider can avoid injury or death as a result of being crushed or pinned by the weight. If you own an older quad bike, consider retrofitting an OPD.

Since 2020, 10 West Aussies have been killed in quad bike accidents. Of the three deaths last year, one was a girl aged under 10.

But quad bikes are not children's toys. The safest option is for children not to ride quads, even as passengers, as they lack the size, and physical strength or skill to safely operate quad bikes built for adults. Even the smaller youth guads have been involved in fatal incidents in Australia.

Consumer Protection urges quad bike riders and passengers to "Prepare Safe, Wear Safe, Ride Safe."

Prepare Safe by ensuring you are trained to ride a quad bike, check the quad has been maintained and is in safe condition. It's also a good idea to tell someone where you plan to go and when you expect to return. When you purchase a new quad bike, use the mandatory hang tag to compare the stability of different models.

Wear Safe with a helmet that meets Australian Safety Standards. Put on protective clothing and gear such as goggles, long sleeves and pants, boots and gloves.

Ride Safe by ensuring children are supervised near quad bike activity and never let them ride guads meant for adults... even as passengers. Never ride under the influence of drugs/alcohol and don't carry passengers on guads meant for one person. Try to ride on familiar tracks and always carry a mobile phone or two-way so you can call for help in an emergency.

If you Prepare Safe, Wear Safe, Ride Safe when using quad bikes, it will help you and your loved ones, friends and work colleagues reduce the risk of injury or death.

Don't let the thrill of a bargain hunt cloud your judgement

Facebook Marketplace, Gumtree, eBay, garage sales and even swap meets can be brimming with a treasure trove of bargains. However, a bargain you buy today could cost you tomorrow.

Buying items through private sellers requires caution to avoid potential issues that may not be covered by Australian Consumer Law (ACL). When you buy goods privately there is a risk they may not work as they should or may not match the advert or description. You won't be protected by the law.

While you may forgo many of your rights protected under the ACL for items purchased privately, you are entitled to undisturbed possession and an item free from debt, unless you are clearly told otherwise. If there is money owing on the item, you could become liable for this debt.

If you are buying a vehicle, caravan, camper trailer or boat it is advisable to spend \$2 and complete a Personal Property Securities Register (PPSR) check if see if there are outstanding debts.

When it comes to privately purchased used vehicles, you are not protected by a statutory warranty or consumer guarantees. However, the car may still be covered by a manufacturer's or extended warranty. In this case, ask the seller to transfer any remaining warranty into your name.

So how about that vintage dress you want to buy off eBay or the latest iPhone you've seen on Facebook Marketplace at a steal?

Consumer Protection advises checking the profile of the seller to see what previous buyers have said and watch out for a too-good-to-be-true price for a high ticket item. Would someone really be selling the latest iPhone for \$300?

There are also safety issues to consider. If you are planning a face-to-face purchase, we advise you meet in a public place to view the item if possible. It's also a good idea to bring along another person.

If something is wrong with the item after you've paid for it, the first step should be to contact the seller to negotiate a solution. Buyer beware - they are under no obligation to negotiate with you.

If the seller won't negotiate, there are a couple of options left. For PayPal payments, file a dispute with their resolution centre within 180 days. For cash or bank transfer payments, it can be very difficult to track down your money.

Cracking the code on diesel pricing with FuelWatch

Unleaded petrol (ULP) prices often grab the headlines but for many West Aussie drivers, diesel is the lifeblood that keeps their utes, trucks, 4WDs and family cars running.

Currently, Tuesday is the cheapest day to fill the tank with petrol, but Consumer Protection's FuelWatch team often receives questions asking when the cheapest day is for diesel.

Diesel does not follow a price cycle in the same way ULP does. The ULP price cycle is a deliberate pricing strategy by the fuel companies. So, it's likely not profitable for them to initiate a similar price cycle for diesel given ULP is the primary fuel in the retail market.

So how are diesel prices set? Australia's wholesale diesel prices are driven by benchmark prices set in Singapore, which is the fuel storage and trading hub in the Asia-Pacific region. The diesel benchmark is generally higher than it is for ULP because of bigger demand in the region. Diesel is used extensively in electricity generation, mining, agriculture, and other primary industries. Given the higher wholesale price, and that the wholesale price makes up most of the retail cost of diesel, it's expected to see, on average, diesel prices sitting above ULP.

There are two types of diesel sold in WA – regular diesel and proprietary branded diesel. FuelWatch defines the proprietary branded diesel as simply 'brand diesel', whereas fuel companies market this as 'premium' diesel because it has a fuel system cleaning additive. Consider whether this is something your car needs before paying a higher price.

FuelWatch often receives complaints about high fuel prices in WA. The good news is data shows that year-to-date Perth has had the cheapest diesel on average in the nation. Last year Perth was equal cheapest with Adelaide and in 2022 Perth was the outright cheapest capital city.

On any given day the price of diesel in the Perth metro area can vary by up to 40 cents per litre, this is why it pays to shop around. Buying diesel from the cheapest site rather than the most expensive, at a difference of 40 cpl, means you could potentially save \$34 on an 85-litre tank (average size of a 4WD tank). Over a year, with regular weekly fill ups, you could save \$1,768.

It takes less than 30 seconds to check the FuelWatch website at www.fuelwatch.wa.gov.au to find the cheapest diesel near you. As some retail sites sell both diesels while others only sell one type, Consumer Protection recommends using the purple toggle button on the FuelWatch website to quickly compare regular diesel and brand diesel prices to ensure you're always finding the cheapest option near you.


