# Recipe

#### **Anzac Biscuts**

**Ingredients** 

1 cup plain flour, 1 cup Desiccated Coconut, 1 cup,1/2 cup caster sugar, 1/4 cup brown sugar, 125g butter, 2 tbsp golden syrup, 1/2 tsp Bicarbonate Soda Method

Step1. Preheat oven to 180C. Line 2 baking trays with baking paper. Place the 1 cup plain flour, 1 cup Desiccated Coconut, 1 cup rolled oats and 1/2 cup caster sugar 1/4 cup brown sugar in a large bowl and stir with a wooden spoon to combine.

Step 2. Place the 125g butter and 2 tbsp golden syrup in a small saucepan over low heat and cook, stirring occasionally, for 3 mins or until butter is melted. Set aside for 5 mins to cool slightly.

Step 3. Combine 1 1/2 tbs boiling water and the 1/2 tsp Bicarbonate Soda in a small bowl. Add to the oat mixture along with the butter mixture. Stir until well combined.

Step 4. Roll tablespoonfuls of the mixture into balls and place on the lined trays, allowing space for spreading. Gently press each ball to flatten slightly. Bake for 15 mins for crisp biscuits. Set aside on the trays to cool completely. The biscuits will harden as they cool.



#### RE: Special meeting on the 21st May 7pm regarding the purchase of 16 Trent Street Frankland River

Since the clubs house on Wingebellup Road fell into disrepair 15 years ago, we have had a consistent issue regarding housing for bar managers employed at the club. Recently 16 Trent Street has been offered for sale to us and we as a committee believe this solution would allow the Frankland District Country Club to offer a convenient and more suitable residence, as part of a salary package to future bar managers, also to assist in attracting and retaining future managers.

16 Trent St has been offered at purchase price of \$240,000.

To finance this purchase I propose we take 3 steps:-

- 1.) The Frankland District Country Club to sell our share portfolio, a current market value approximately \$140,000.
- 2.) The Frankland District Country Club can secure a \$30,000 interest free loan from Cranbrook Shire. Loan term is ten years. To be repaid in twenty equal repayments of \$1,500, to be paid biannually.
- 3.) Frankland Community Cropping Group have kindly offered to donate \$70,000 for balance of purchase price, plus up to \$9,000 for stamp duty, transfer Fee and Conveyancing, plus up to \$20,000 for incidental renovations. A total of up to \$99,000.

The cost to the Frankland District Country Club is \$170,000 to obtain a \$240,000 asset.

Currently the Frankland District Country Club is paying \$250/week to rent for 58 Trent street. This equates to \$13,000/annum, excluding utilities. 16 Trent Street we believe is a more suitable rental house, and as we own the asset it can be offered to a future bar manager at a subsidised rate as part of a salary package. If the future bar manager doesn't require the residence as we can earn a return on the full current value in rent. Both of these scenario's would cover our loan repayments to Cranbrook Shire.

In order to manage our asset our Treasurer set up a separate account for comings and goings, associated with the property. The ongoing viability of the asset can be reviewed within the AGM.

One Committee member will be appointed to supervise the maintenance of property.

The committee or myself can be available for questions & discussions about this issue prior to the special meeting. Otherwise I hope to see you on the 21st May at 7pm. Proxy votes can be accepted, please email Jess Dawson on franklandcountryclub.secretary@gmail.com

# **Backyard Buddies**

Your monthly guide to pests, weeds and diseases

#### In focus - diagnostic photography



Head front and lateral views of an exotic black imported fire ant (Solenopsis richteri) worker, focus stacked with a stereomicroscope and dedicated high-resolution digital camera.

Imaging technologies have evolved significantly over the past decade in terms of image resolution, quality, and magnification. It's easy to observe these changes just by looking at the continuous advancements in digital cameras and mobile phones. Less apparent to many is the progress made in macro and micro photography, significantly enhancing the ability to identify invertebrates, fungi, bacteria, and other subjects.

Modern software has evolved too. One such development is a process called 'focus stacking'. Multiple images, focused at different distances are combined, or 'stacked' to form a single, fully focused image. The images featured in this article were produced through focus stacking, making complex diagnostic features easily identifiable.

#### **Our subject**

The ant photographed is about 3 mm in length. This species is not present in Australia and is of biosecurity concern. To identify this species, diagnosticians (aka taxonomists) need to be able to see its microscopic features, which include a 2 segmented waist and 10 segmented antennae, with the last 2 segments forming a distinct club.

To get a bit more technical, a characteristic seen only among the 2 species of imported fire ant, is the median tooth centred along the front edge of the clypeus, which is flanked by 2 lateral teeth. The clypeus is one of the plates that form the "face" of an insect.

#### The digital advantage

Having digital reference material provides so many advantages. Photographing living specimens prior to curation allows for the full colour spectrum of a species to be captured and permanently recorded. Preserved specimens can lose their colours over time, for example, the eye colour of dragonflies and fruit flies fade shortly after they die.

Diagnostic imaging can facilitate fast-tracked identification as photos may be shared directly with specialists across the globe. This is particularly useful when local experts are not available or further verification is required. Utilising diagnostic photos also reduces the need to send specimens and helps safeguard them from damage and loss.

When communicating about the various pests or diseases that are present in WA or highlighting those to look out for, being able to show them in the environment, and the damage they cause is essential. Our department's imaging specialist helps to do this by creating high-quality digital products. Many of which are available on the Pest and Disease Image Library (padil.gov.au) and are featured on our website and communication products like posters, factsheets, and videos.

#### Flash or not?

If you have taken a photo of something you don't recognise and it's not as flash as the ones featured in this article, don't worry! Please still report it. Photos and the information provided with them help us screen for pests and diseases of biosecurity concern.














Entries for the 2024 Shaun Tan Award for Young Artists open in just a few weeks! Now is the perfect time to start thinking about your work of art.

Darwin Spitfires - The Real battle for Australia - Anthony Cooper

The Japanese air raids on Darwin on 19 February 1942 are well known to most Australians, but what happened afterwards?

For almost two years the airspace over north-west Australia was routinely infiltrated by Japanese air raids, tallying about 70 in total. The 1942–43 air raids on Darwin constituted the only sustained and intensive direct assault on Australian territory in the whole of World War II. Telling the story of the RAAF's No. 1 Fighter Wing – composed of both Australian and British Spitfire pilots – Darwin Spitfires explores the little-known 1943 season of air combat over the Top End, recovering important aspects



of Australian history. It brings the heroic exploits of the skilled pilots who did so much to protect Australia to the world's attention.

Japanese Major General Horii Tomitarô, commanding the South Seas Force, had the Australians on the back foot.

Retaking Kokoda - The Battles for Templeton's Crossing, Eora Creek and the Oivi-Gorari Positions - David W. Cameron

Australia was holding the last defendable ridge in the Owen Stanley ranges, Imita Ridge. Horii to his distress was then given orders from Imperial Headquarters in Tokyo that he was to fall back across the mountains to the Japanese beachheads at Gona, Sanananda, and Buna, leaving a force between Templeton's Crossing and Eora Creek to stop any Australian advance through the mountains. The Japanese, unknown to the Australians evacuated Ioribaiwa Ridge just before they launched their attacks and to their amazement on storming the heights, the Australians encountered no resistance – the Japanese had gone.

This, however, did not mean the fighting on the Kokoda Track was over, far from it. Three more desperate actions would be fought by the Australians and Japanese, before the decisive battles for the Japanese beachheads could be decided – the battles for Templeton's Crossing, Eora Creek, and finally the Oivi-Gorari positions on the northern lowland plains. Just 15-kilometres east lay the Kumusi River, the last geographical barrier before reaching the strongly fortified Japanese beachheads themselves.

Let the Bastards Come - The Battle for Kapyong Korea, 23 – 25 April 1951 - David W. Cameron

Anzac Day 2024 represents the 73rd anniversary of the critical battle of Kapyong (23 to 25 April 1951) This book for the first time tells the full story of the Australian, Canadian, New Zealand and American units involved. Fewer than 1,000 Australian and Canadian infantrymen, supported by New Zealand artillery and 15 American Sherman tanks fought off an entire Chinese Division of over 12,000 men and contributed significantly to defeating the great Chinese August offensive.

The battle of Kapyong was fought during a heavy downpour in mountainous terrain, with Chinese units infiltrating the Australian lines which extended for seven kilometres. Given the small number of men involved and the long defensive line, several strong points were quickly established. The Australians almost alone, but with support from New Zealand gunners and some American tanks, for the first 24 hours held back the Chinese and were at times surrounded by large numbers of Chinese who launched ongoing human wave attacks against their isolated positions — but the line held with Australians leading bayonet counter charges against the Chinese. Within 24 hours, Canadian troops were committed to the battle and for 12 hours also faced significant attempts by the Chinese to surround their position — they too held their ground. The battle of Kapyong was truly a decisive battle of the Korean War, and for their heroic actions during the battle of Kapyong, the Australian and Canadian infantrymen and American tankers were awarded a rare US Presidential Unit citation.

#### Missing - War, Sacrifice and the Search for Justice - Ian W. Shaw

Not all casualties in wartime occur on the frontline; when a loved one is posted "Missing," hope and fear bloom in the hearts of those who wait for news. Lives can fray when that wait extends to years. Squadron Leader Daryl Sproule, DFC was a hero. The young and dashing Hobart lawyer was a fighter pilot, a survivor of the carnage in the skies over Singapore, a champion sportsman and the touchstone in the life of his single mother. When his aircraft was shot down over New Britain in August 1943, his wingmen saw him land it close to a beach, wade ashore and disappear into the jungle.

In Hobart, Irene Sproule was informed that her son was "Missing." Two years later, Daryl was still missing, his fate unknown. It would take another two years for the full, deplorable story to be unraveled and the consequences of a wartime atrocity to be played out to a conclusion. In those years, a mother and a brother would have their lives changed brutally, and forever. Missing is the story of the nightmare that haunts all those who have farewelled their loved ones as they leave for war ...

HMAS Sydney was the pride of the fleet during the Second World War. A light cruiser and one of Australia's main combat vessels. The Sinking of HMAS Sydney - How Sailors Lived, Fought and Died in Australia's Greatest Naval Disaster - Doctor Tom Lewis On the 19th November 1941, off the coast of Western Australia, The Sydney engaged in a fierce and bloody battle with the German raider Kormoran. Following this action, The Sydney failed to return to port. An extensive search and rescue carried out, but the warship had disappeared with all 645 men on board. Whilst the battle lasted little more than an hour, this single ship engagement remains Australia's greatest naval disaster. More Australian servicemen died in the battle between the German raider Kormoran and the light cruiser HMAS Sydney than perished in the Vietnam War.

It was not until 2008 that the wreck was discovered. The passage of time between the sinking and the discovery led to numerous mystery and conspiracy theories, all of which started replacing the truth. Now, with an explanation of how those on board lived, fought, and died, this book tells the full story.

You may have forgotten about the Do Not Call register, which is a free service run by the Australian Communications and Media Authority (ACMA). You can register your home, personal mobile or fax number online via donotcall.gov.au or call 1300 792 958. The good news is you only need to register once.

Telemarketers then have 30 days to stop contact. The *Do Not Call Register* legislation applies not only to Australian telemarketers but also businesses within Australia that use overseas-based telemarketers and businesses based overseas making calls to Australian numbers.

The register works by requiring telemarketers to submit a list of phone numbers they wish to call to the Register Operator. The Register identifies any numbers that are not permitted to be called and they are removed from calling lists.

Keep in mind research or survey related calls are not telemarketing, so you may still receive these, as well as calls from registered political parties, politicians, government agencies, election candidates, registered charities or educational institutions where you are or were a student. These are all exempt. However, there are still rules to be followed.

Telemarketers can only call between 9am-8pm Monday-Friday and 9am-5pm on Saturdays and never on Sundays. Researchers can call 9am-8.30pm Monday-Friday and 9am-5pm on Saturday and Sundays. Neither can call on a national public holiday.

The caller must tell you their name, the name of their employer and why they are calling and their caller ID must not be blocked. They also must end the call if you ask them to.

Unfortunately scam calls won't stop after registration. A legitimate caller should not mind if you want to verify their identity. You should never give an unsolicited caller any personal or financial information, including credit card details, or access to your computer.

Receiving an SMS about a sale from your favourite clothing store is helpful but when do 'helpful' texts turn

into unwanted spam?

Marketing texts must also follow rules set out by ACMA. The business needs to have your consent, for example you ticked 'subscribe' on a form or entered a competition, include contact details and offer a way for you to unsubscribe or opt-out.

After you unsubscribe or opt-out the business must generally stop sending marketing texts within five days.

You can report spam messages to ACMA by forwarding the message to their dedicated SMS line — 0429 999 888, or you can report it online via ACMA's spam complaint form. Also consider blocking the number on your phone. ACMA does take action and most recently issued penalties of over \$3.7 million to Luxottica (Sunglass Hut, Oakley, OPSM), Uber Australia, Kmart Australia and Ticketek for breaches of spam rules.

And just like with unsolicited calls, you may still receive text messages during elections or from registered charities and other Government bodies.


